Learning outcomes

The aim of this course is to involve philosophy students in active philosophical thinking as opposed to present them with the result of the thinking of philosophers of the tradition. The outcome of the course should be for the students to have developed a philosophical vocabulary to understand what is involved in thinking. The aim of the course is to provide students with a working account of what the mind is, what world is, what theories of thinking there are.

Teaching and learning methods

In this lecture I give a short but succinct introduction to thinking by turning around the lecture format. Instead of lecturing first and discussing afterwards, I will invite students to jump into the process of thinking and build up with the materials of the lecture through that. At the end of each lecture, I give a short summary of what I prepared the lecture to be about. A challenge of this format is that while we focus on one aspect of thinking, all the other aspects need to be presupposed.
