1. A literary critic analysis of J.K. Rowling's Harry Potter novels:

- A tale unfolding: the overall-plot and its seven sub-plots
- Personnel: designing individual characters and building-up a rich cosmos of figures
- Shifting narrated time(s) and space(s): platform 9 3/4 and the room of requriement ...; Hermione's time-turner and Dumbledore's pensive ...
- Narrative devices in Fantastic literature: Suspense and surprise; horror and humor; role models and stereotypes; intertextuality; high and low levels of narrative plausibility

2. Specials Items

- Professor Trelawney's prophecy
- The Last enemy to be destroyed: "Voldemort's project" and the Horcruxes
- Why Harry became "good" while Tom Riddle became "evil"?
- The Boy who lived and the Chosen One: Harry's way to be a "Savior and Redeemer"
- The wisdom of Albus Dumbledore
- Possible levels of reading: entertainment, philosophy, religion, biblical theology

Learning Outcomes

After having followed the lectures and written their papers students should be able to discuss the impact of J. K. Rowling's series of novels on individual readers and its contribution to popular culture in a scolarly informed manner. And - as a personal extra benefit – this should enable them to reread the Harry Potter-tale with still more pleasure than hitherto.
