Contents

The lecture is an introduction to ancient and medieval philosophy. There will be accompanying literature for each session that you will read concurrently. You will hear in this lecture from the beginning of Western philosophy, from the Pre-Socratics and the Sophists, from Socrates, Plato, Aristotle and the Peripatetics, the Stoa, the Epicureans. We deal with the Gnosis and the Neoplatonism. In the Middle Ages, the program will include Augustine, Anselm of Canterbury, Thomas Aquinas, John Duns Scotus, and William Occam. I will also aim to introduce a female philosopher in each session.
